




# FIG.01 HISTORIC CONTEXT, LISTED BUILDINGS AND CONSERVATION AREAS

Seven conservation areas are within both the study boundary and Lambeth, including South Bank, Waterloo, Roupell Street, Mitre Road and Ufford Street, Lower Marsh, Albert Embankment and Lambeth Palace. 
#### **GREEN AND OPEN SPACES**


# TRANSPORT: WALKING AND CYCLING NETWORK





# PEDESTRIAN MOVEMENT: VICTORY ARCH







# **MATERIAL STUDY: 'SOUTH BANK SPINE'**








# **MATERIAL STUDY: EMMA CONS GARDENS**


Survey of the ground materials within and surrounding Emma Cons Gardens to illustrate the changes in character and quality of materials in this area.





#### FRONTAGES: EMMA CONS GARDENS


Survey of the frontage condition within and around Emma Cons Gardens, based on the interaction between the public realm and the facades. Active frontages have a high level of interaction with the street, while passive frontages create overlooking. Blank frontages are either blank walls or facades that block views in and out of the interior spaces.

In order to illustrate the range of conditions encountered between the river and the centre of the Waterloo and South Bank area, a photo study was made of the route mapped out below.
